1648 BREWERY East Hoathly, East Sussex	<b>Original (3.9% ABV)</b> The "first brew": it is light in colour full of flavour with a dry aftertaste. Light, quaffable and easy-drinking.		
	<b>Signature (4.4% ABV)</b> An award winning light-coloured beer; this best bitter with distinctive hop notes was launched at this beer festival in 2004.		
	<b>Saint George (4.5% ABV)</b> Brewed with Sussex Hops, Malted barley and South Downs water. A real English beer for Saint George - A Patron Saint is there all year round.		
	<b>Triple Champion (4.0% ABV)</b> A brand new beer; try it and see what you think!		
ARUNDEL Ford, West Sussex	<b>ASB (4.5% ABV)</b> A special bitter with a complex roast malt flavour leading to a fruity, hoppy bitter-sweet finish.		
	<b>Castle (3.8% ABV)</b> A pale tawny beer with fruit and malt noticeable in the aroma. The flavour has a good balance of malt, fruit and hops, with a dry, hoppy finish.		
	<b>Old Knucker (5.5% ABV)</b> Dark old ale with a malt and fruit aroma. Malt dominates the taste with bittersweet coffee finish.		
	<b>Sussex Gold (4.2% ABV)</b> A golden-coloured best bitter with a strong floral hop aroma. The ale is clean tasting and surprisingly bitter with a tangy citrus flavour and long, dry finish.		
	<b>Sussex Mild (3.7% ABV)</b> A dark mild with strong chocolate and roast aromas, which lead to a bitter taste. Slight aftertaste where the initial flavours remain in the dry clean finish.		

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<b>BALLARDS</b> Nyewood, West Sussex	<b>Best Bitter (4.2% ABV)</b> A copper-coloured beer with malty aroma. A good balance of fruit and malt in the flavour gives way to a dry hoppy aftertaste.		
	<b>Midhurst Mild (3.5% ABV)</b> Traditional dark mild, well-balanced; refreshing with a biscuity flavour.		
	<b>Nyewood Gold (5.0% ABV)</b> Robust golden brown strong bitter very hoppy and fruity throughout with a tasty balanced finish.		
	<b>Trotton Bitter (3.6% ABV)</b> An amber clean tasting bitter. A roast malt aroma leads to a fruity slightly sweet taste and a dry finish. A seasonal beer for spring.		
	<b>Wassail (6.0% ABV)</b> A strong, full-bodied, fruity, tawny beer with predominance of malt throughout, but also an underlying hoppiness.		
	<b>Wild (4.7% ABV)</b> This is a brewery blend of Mild and the 6% ABV Wassail - hence the name.		
<b>BEACHY HEAD</b> East Dean, East Sussex	<b>Beachy Original (4.2% ABV)</b> A traditional English bitter brewed with floor malted barley and hops from English producers. It has a hoppy flavour with light floral notes.		
	<b>Parson Derby's Hole (4.0% ABV)</b> This is a dark stout; it is named after Parson Derby who is credited with saving many lives at Beachy Head by excavating "Parson Darby's Hole" in the caverns that already existed near Belle Tout. He created a chimney that led up from the coast and "rooms" above it where he set lights on ledges on very stormy nights.		
<b>CUSTOM BEERS</b> Haywards Heath, West Sussex	<b>Cascade Special (4.8% ABV)</b> A festival special version of the Cascade bitter.		
	<b>Centennial Pale Ale (3.8% ABV)</b> This mid-brown beer is crammed with Centennial hops to give a strong hop character to the aroma and flavour leading to a good hop finish.		
	<b>Smooth Mild (3.8% ABV)</b> A traditional dark mild with roast malts complemented by hop notes.		
	<b>Spicee Jamaican Stout (5.0% ABV)</b> This is a strong dark stout with Jamaican jerk spices!		
	<b>Strong Mild (4.8% ABV)</b> This is a festival special - hops will be in evidence!		

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<b>DARK STAR</b> Ansty, West Sussex	<b>American Pale Ale (4.7% ABV)</b> An American yeast strain along with strong flavoured Chinook and and Centennial hops are used in the recipe for this golden, dry, hoppy beer.		
	<b>Critical Mass (7.8% ABV)</b> A strong dark-roasted full-flavoured winter ale that has been maturing for some time.		
	<b>Espresso (4.2% ABV)</b> A black beer brewed with roasted barley malt and Challenger hops with freshly ground espresso coffee beans also added to the copper for a few minutes after the boil to provide a rich and complementary coffee aroma.		
	<b>Hophead (3.8% ABV)</b> A golden-coloured bitter with a fruity/hoppy aroma and a citrus/bitter taste and aftertaste. Wonderfully hoppy and clean tasting with a refreshing mouth feel. Flavours remain strong to the end.		
	<b>Six Hop Ale (6.5% ABV)</b> Brewed with five different hop varieties in the copper and then dry hopped after fermentation this pale beer is designed for those who like their hops as an extreme sport!		
	<b>Spring Equinox (4.0% ABV)</b> A zesty ale; straw in colour and bursting with the fresh pale green fruitiness of Amarillo hops.		
<b>FILO</b> First In Last Out, Hastings, East Sussex	<b>Cardinal's Porter (4.6% ABV)</b> A dark porter with burnt caramel, malt and a dry finish with coffee and hops.		
	<b>Crofters (3.8% ABV)</b> A mid-brown beer with a "typical bitter" and fruit aroma, the taste has malt berry fruits and toffee. A hoppy finish.		
	<b>Ginger Tom (4.6% ABV)</b> A light-brown beer with some hoppiness and a ginger flavour.		
	<b>Gold (4.8% ABV)</b> Golden premium ale pleasantly flavoured and lightly hopped.		
<b>GRIBBLE</b> Gribble Inn, Oving, West Sussex	<b>Bashful Beaver (4.3% ABV)</b> This occasional brew is amber-brown in colour with a light malty and fruity aroma. Caramel toffee sweetness in taste with slight hop notes.		
	<b>Gribble Best (4.1% ABV)</b> A medium strength hoppy bitter; one of the pub's best sellers.		
	<b>Pig's Ear (5.8% ABV)</b> This is a full-bodied old ale with a rich ruby-brown colour.		

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	<b>Plucker Mild (3.5% ABV)</b> A dark mild almost black in colour with a mild grainy and malt aroma. Roast malt and fruit are present in the taste.		
	<b>Reg's Tipple (5.0% ABV)</b> This was named after a customer from the early days of the brewery. It has a smooth nutty flavour with a pleasant after bite.		
	<b>Toff's Ale (4.0% ABV)</b> This is a light, easy-drinking bitter with a citric hop character.		
<b>HAMMERPOT</b> Hammerpot, West Sussex	<b>FnL (6.0% ABV)</b> This is a strong bitter beer.		
	<b>Madgwick Gold (5.0% ABV)</b> A golden ale with a fresh citrus / spice hop flavour and nose. Very drinkable with a refreshing thirst quenching finish.		
	<b>Meteor (3.8% ABV)</b> A chestnut coloured session bitter with a combination of malts giving a depth of character. Smooth in the mouth yet with a hop character that gives a pleasant refreshing and slightly dry finish.		
	<b>Porter (4.7% ABV)</b> This is a draught version of the brewery's successful "Bottle Wreck Porter".		
	<b>White Wing (4.0% ABV)</b> A golden coloured light bitter with a fruit/citric hop flavours and a gentle bitter finish.		
<b>HARVEY</b> Lewes, East Sussex	<b>1859 Porter (4.8% ABV)</b> This is brewed to a 1859 recipe, coffee and hop notes are dominant in the taste and the long finish.		
	<b>Armada Ale (4.5% ABV)</b> Hoppy amber best bitter. Well-balanced fruit and hops dominate throughout with a fruity palate.		
	<b>Hadlow Bitter (3.5% ABV)</b> This is a notably hoppy light bitter (the old PA recipe) using hops grown in the Hadlow area of Kent. It has a long dry finish.		
	<b>Old Ale (4.0% ABV)</b> A rich dark beer a good malty and fruit aroma. The flavour is a complex blend of roast malt, grain, fruit, hops and some caramel. Malty caramel finish.		
	<b>Sussex Best Bitter (4.0% ABV)</b> This is a full-bodied brown bitter. A hoppy aroma leads to a good malt and hop balance, with a dry aftertaste.		

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<b>HEPWORTH</b> Horsham, West Sussex	<b>Iron Horse (4.8% A.B.V)</b> A premium bitter with a dense flavour and subtle sweetness.		
	<b>Old Ale (4.8% ABV)</b> A classic black old ale with rich nutty roast flavours and hop notes balancing the overall sweetness.		
	<b>Prospect (4.5% ABV)</b> Brewed from natural organic ingredients including Sussex Barley malt, Golding and Admiral hops which provide a well-balanced bitter beer.		
	<b>Pullman (4.2% ABV)</b> A sweet, nutty maltiness and fruitiness are balanced by hops and bitterness in this easy-drinking, pale brown bitter, with a subtle finish.		
	<b>Traditional Sussex Bitter (3.6% ABV)</b> A fine clean-tasting amber session beer. A pleasant fruity and hoppy aroma that leads to a crisp, tangy taste. A long dry finish.		
<b>KEMPTOWN</b> Brighton & Hove	<b>Kempton Bitter (4.0% ABV)</b> This is the new version of the beer produced by the new brewer - expect a better balance of malt and hops.		
<b>KING</b> Horsham, West Sussex	<b>Five Generations (4.4% ABV)</b> Brewed to celebrate the King family brewing in Horsham for 5 generations or 150 years. The beer is mid strength and amber in colour. Goldings and Cascade hops are used in the recipe.		
	<b>Horsham Best (3.8% ABV)</b> A predominately malty best bitter, brown in colour. The nutty flavours have some sweetness with bitterness that grows in the aftertaste.		
	<b>Mother-in-Law (4.1% ABV)</b> A brewery version of the classic blend, King's Old and Horsham Best; mid to dark brown and full flavoured.		
	<b>Old Ale (4.5% ABV)</b> Award winning old ale brewed to have a full and rich but smooth flavour, very dark in colour.		
	<b>Red River (4.8% ABV)</b> A full-flavoured mid brown beer with a red tinge. Very malty with berry fruitiness in the aroma and taste. Bitter note finish.		
	<b>Scrummy Bitter (5.0% ABV)</b> Specially brewed for the 6 Nations rugby tournament; strong in alcohol with a good malty and bitter taste.		
<b>LANGHAM</b> Lodsworth, West Sussex	<b>Halfway to Heaven (3.5% ABV)</b> Auburn/chestnut colour. It is well-balanced between crisp biscuity maltiness and fruit hops with a hint of bitterness in the finish.		

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	<b>Hip Hop (4.0% ABV)</b> A classic blonde beer; clean and crisp. The nose is loaded with floral hop, while the pale malt flavour has a pleasing dry and bitter finish.		
	<b>Strong Ale (5.2% ABV)</b> A newish, full-bodied strong bitter with malty flavour and short finish.		
	<b>Sundowner (4.2% ABV)</b> Golden amber in colour with hoppy and fruity notes. Has a dry finish.		
<b>RECTORY</b>	<i>We are very sorry, but there are no beers from Rectory Ales this time.</i>		
<b>ROTHER VALLEY</b> Northiam, East Sussex	<b>Boadicea (4.6% ABV)</b> A pale refreshing occasionally brewed ale only using the Boadicea hop giving a fresh citrus character to the ale, not the usual bitter!		
	<b>Copper Ale (4.1% ABV)</b> Copper coloured, quite bitter in flavour with a small amount of chocolate to balance. Dry short finish.		
	<b>Honey Fuzz (3.8% ABV)</b> A fairly new beer produced using locally sourced organic honey.		
	<b>Level Best (4.0% ABV)</b> Full-bodied tawny session bitter with a malt and fruit aroma, malty taste and a dry finish.		
	<b>Smild (3.8% ABV)</b> A traditional dark mild with a full roast body with a hint of chocolate.		
<b>WELTONS</b> Horsham, West Sussex	<b>Cassablanca (3.5% ABV)</b> <i>Sorry no tasting notes available.</i>		
	<b>Old Ale (4.5% ABV)</b> Roast and toffee flavours predominate with some bitterness in this traditional old ale. Bittersweet with plenty of caramel and roast in a rather short finish.		
	<b>Old Cocky (4.3% ABV)</b> A combative beer; the full flavour is declared the moment it hits your palate banishing forever weaker opponents.		
	<b>Pride 'n' Joy (2.8% ABV)</b> A light brown bitter with a slight malty and hoppy aroma. Fruity with a pleasant hoppiness and some sweetness in the flavour, leading to a short malty finish.		
	<b>Snow Joke (7.1% ABV)</b> Dark brown/black in colour with a chocolate and dark fruit aroma. Quite sweet with a tart finish.		
	<b>Tree Fellers (4.6% ABV)</b> A new dark beer; sorry no further tasting notes available.		

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WHITE Bexhill-on-Sea, East Sussex	<b>1066 Country Bitter (4.0% ABV)</b> Amber-gold in colour, a light, sweetish beer with good malt and hop balance and a bitter refreshing finish.		
	<b>Chilly Willy (5.1% ABV)</b> Ruby/dark brown in colour with dark treacle and liquorice in the taste and spice notes in the aroma with slightly spicy herb finish.		
	<b>Heart of Rother (4.5% ABV)</b> This bitter is amber in colour with a zesty hop character and a surprising little kick.

ACORN Wombwell, South Yorkshire	<b>Cluster IPA (5.0% ABV)</b> Traditional India Pale Ale dominated by fruit and hops, light golden in colour with a floral aroma.		
ARBOR ALES The Old Tavern Stapleton, Bristol	<b>Snuffy Jack's (5.9% ABV)</b> This a strong dark old ale features a large amount crystal malt in the mash. First Gold and Northdown hops are also evident in this brew.		
B & T Shefford, Bedfordshire	<b>Crooked Hooker (4.7% ABV)</b> Brewed to celebrate the Six Nations Rugby Championships. This scrummy beer has a brilliant balance of malt and hops		
BANK TOP Bolton, Lancashire.	<b>Dark Mild (4.0% ABV)</b> Dark brown and complex, plenty of roast malt, dry finish.		
BARTRAMS Rougham, Suffolk	<b>Bantam Stout (4.8% ABV)</b> A robust stout with the chocolate and smoky aroma giving way to a sweeter finish with just a hint of tartness.		
BATEMAN Wainfleet All Saints, Lincolnshire	<b>XXXB (4.8% ABV)</b> A brilliant blend of malt, hops and fruit on the nose with a bitter bite over the top of a faintly banana maltiness that stays the course. A russet-brown classic.		
BATTLEDOWN Cheltenham.	<b>Four Kings (7.2% ABV)</b> A new strong ale from this brewery.		

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Gloucestershire	<b>Saxon (3.8% ABV)</b> Light gold pale ale, fresh and lively with a clean dry taste.		
<b>BAYS</b> Paignton, Devon	<b>Bays Best (3.7% ABV)</b> An award winning Devon Best Bitter, amber in colour. A well balanced clean and crisp session beer with a dry hoppy finish.		
<b>BAZENS</b> Salford, Greater Manchester	<b>Knoll Street Porter (5.2% ABV)</b> Dark brown beer with chocolate and malt aroma. Roast and chocolate malt, hops and fruit to taste, with satisfying complex finish.		
<b>BLACK SHEEP</b> Masham, North Yorkshire.	<b>Best Bitter (3.8% ABV)</b> A hoppy and fruity beer with strong bitter overtones, leading to a long, dry, bitter finish.		
<b>BLACKDOWN</b> Honiton, Devon	<b>Premium (4.7% ABV)</b> A rich dark brown ale with a generous full-bodied flavour and sensuous character. Late hopping of the Goldings promotes a lasting moreish aftertaste and full aroma.		
<b>BLINDMANS</b> Leighton, Somerset	<b>Golden Spring (4.0% ABV)</b> SIBA UK Award winning fresh and aromatic straw coloured beer brewed using selected lager malt.		
<b>BOWMANS</b> Droxford, Hampshire	<b>Elderado (3.5% ABV)</b> A subtle injection of Elder Flowers defines this beer. This beer has plenty of character and a lovely bitter finish.		
	<b>Nutz (5.0% ABV)</b> Aroma and taste dominated by Chestnuts; it is brewed with organic Chestnuts from the farm of Patrice Dupre in the Ardeche region of France. May contain nuts!		
	<b>Swift One (3.8% ABV)</b> Pale golden quaffing ale with excellent flavours for its strength. Pleasingly hoppy throughout also possessing of a fine aroma. The finish is dry with a small twist of sweetness at the end.		
<b>BRADFIELD</b> Sheffield, South Yorkshire	<b>Farmers Stout (4.5% ABV)</b> A dark stout with roasted malts and flaked oats and a subtle, bitter hop character.		
<b>BRAINS</b> Cardiff	<b>Dark (3.5% ABV)</b> A tasty, classic dark brown mild, a mix of malt, roast, caramel with a background of hops. Bittersweet, mellow and with a lasting finish of malt and roast.		
<b>BRECONSHIRE</b> Brecon, Powys	<b>Cribyn (4.5% ABV)</b> A very pale, straw coloured aromatic Best Bitter, the spicy and aromatic nose, leads to intense hop flavours creating a splendidly refreshing beer.		

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	<b>Fuzzy Dragon (5.0% ABV)</b> Born in the Mountains of Wales, rare and thought to be mythical, this golden ale only emerges after the long Winter starts to recede. This beastie has unseen strength and a hint of fire in its heart...		
<b>BRENTWOOD</b> Brentwood, Essex.	<b>Spooky Moon (3.8% ABV)</b> Dark traditional style session bitter with a sweet fruity aftertaste, brewed using Chocolate Malt and Bramling Cross Hops for an extra special flavour.		
<b>CALEDONIAN</b> Edinburgh	<b>Chocolate Drop (3.8% ABV)</b> An attractive chocolate colour and luscious silky chocolate flavour crammed with hints of malt roast and caramel, made with organic chocolate. A bit of a malt teaser for Easter!		
<b>CASTLE ROCK</b> Nottingham.	<b>Great Crested Grebe (4.2% ABV)</b> Golden colour with malty aroma, the flavour is sweet malt with a touch of citrus hop, and a lingering fruity finish. The "Natural Selection" beer for March.		
	<b>Starling (3.8% ABV)</b> The "Natural Selection" beer for February; raising funds for the Nottingham Wildlife Trust.		
<b>CITY OF CAMBRIDGE</b> Cambridgeshire.	<b>Atomic Ale (4.5% ABV)</b> Formerly "Atom Splitter"; this is a robust copper-coloured bitter with a hop aroma and taste, and a distinct sulphury edge.		
<b>COASTAL</b> Redruth, Cornwall	<b>Angelina (4.1% ABV)</b> A hugely successful beer, hoppy, clean and refreshing.		
	<b>Golden Hinde (4.3% ABV)</b> A golden coloured beer in the best bitter style.		
<b>COTLEIGH</b> Wiveliscombe, Somerset.	<b>Golden Seahawk (4.2% ABV)</b> A gold, well-hopped premium bitter with a flowery hop aroma and fruity hop flavour, clean mouth feel, leading to dry, hoppy finish.		
	<b>Tawny (3.8% ABV)</b> Well-balanced tawny coloured bitter with plenty of malt and fruitiness on the nose, and malt to the fore in the taste, followed by hop fruit, developing to a satisfying bitter finish.		
<b>CROUCH VALE</b> South Woodham Ferrers, Essex	<b>Amarillo (5.0% ABV)</b> Brewed with the Amarillo variety hop - glorious smells and lasting spicy flavour.		
	<b>Blackwater Mild (3.7% ABV)</b> Dark, roasty and bitter with a dry finish.		
	<b>Brewers Gold (4.0% ABV)</b> Golden ale with citrus hop aroma and a sweet, soft, fruity emphasis in the initial taste. The drying aftertaste sees a return of the lemon and orange on the aroma.		

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<b>DERBY</b> Derby.	<b>Dashingly Dark (4.5% ABV)</b> A complex balance of flavours produces this dark rich brew.		
<b>DERVENTIO</b> Trusley, Derbyshire	<b>Versuvio (6.5% ABV)</b> This is a strong red coloured bitter; a new seasonal ale for 2008.		
<b>DOWNTON</b> Downton, Wiltshire	<b>Euro Quad (4.0% ABV)</b> Golden in colour, full of fruity hop flavours, bitterness and aroma.		
<b>ELGOOD'S</b> Wisbech, Cambridgeshire	<b>Black Dog (3.6% ABV)</b> Reddish black with liquorice, rounded by hints of roast malt and a growing dry bitterness.		
<b>ELLAND</b> Elland, West Yorkshire.	<b>Bargee (3.8% ABV)</b> Amber, creamy session bitter. Fruity, hoppy aromas and taste complemented by a bitter edge in the finish.		
	<b>Demon's Eye (5.2% ABV)</b> A brand new ruby coloured beer created by head brewer David Sanders. Strong deep copper coloured malty bitter with a dry finish.		
	<b>Gary Mitchell, Old Skool (5.0% ABV)</b> Premium copper-coloured bitter. A good old fashioned flavour.		
<b>EMPIRE</b> Slaithwaite, West Yorkshire	<b>Crusader (5.0% ABV)</b> Light coloured ale with distinctive pine/lemon citrus flavour, good hoppy nose with moderate bitterness.		
<b>ENVILLE</b> Stourbridge, West Midlands	<b>Ale (4.5% ABV)</b> Golden ale with a sweet, hoppy aroma. Sweet start when the honey kicks in, but a hoppy ending with a whisky and heather blend; thirst-quenching.		
	<b>Porter (4.5% ABV)</b> Black with a creamy head and sulphurous aroma. Sweet and fruity start with touches of spice. Good balance between sweet and bitter, but hops dominate the finish.		
	<b>Ginger (4.6% ABV)</b> Golden bright with gently gingered tangs. A drinkable beer with no acute flavours but a satisfying aftertaste of sweet hoppiness.		
<b>EXMOOR</b> Wiveliscombe, Somerset.	<b>Hound Dog (4.0% ABV)</b> A dark-gold bitter with distinctive citrus fruit notes apparent in the aroma, toffee and vanilla in the taste with a long bittersweet finish.		
<b>FESTIVAL</b> Cheltenham, Gloucestershire	<b>Ruby (4.7% ABV)</b> A rich red-coloured full-bodied bitter.		
<b>GOACHERS</b> Tovil, Kent	<b>Gold Star (5.1% ABV)</b> A strong pale ale brewed from 1005 Maris Otter malt and East Kent Goldings hops.		

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	<b>Real Mild Ale (3.4% ABV)</b> Full-flavoured malty ale with background bitterness.		
<b>GRAIN</b> Alburgh, Norfolk	<b>Tamarind IPA (5.5% ABV)</b> A classic India Pale Ale with a clean and crisp malt character and flavoured with Brewer's Gold hops for a strong bitter taste but a spicy resinous finish with a hint of citrus lemon.		
<b>HAMBLETON</b> Melmerby, North Yorkshire.	<b>Nightmare (5.0% ABV)</b> This impressively-flavoured beer satisfies all parts of the palate. Roast malts dominate, but hoppiness rears out of this complex blend.		
<b>HAMPSHIRE</b> Romsey, Hampshire	<b>Hampshire Hare (4.8% ABV)</b> A golden premium single hop bitter with rich malt freshness and spicy hop aroma. Bitterness comes through the aftertaste.		
	<b>Penny Black Porter (4.5% ABV)</b> Mellow and enticing aroma of black and roasted malts balanced by a clean bitterness and smooth full palate.
